## **Understanding Geographic Relationships**



Blocks are <u>not</u> defined by population and are the smallest geographic level at which data are ever released (Decennial Census, not the ACS)

- 600 to 3,000 population
- 240 to 1,200 housing units

- 1,200 to 8,000 population (optimum 4,000)
- 480 to 3,200 housing units

### **Race and Ethnicity**

#### **Key Concepts**

- The Census Bureau collects race and ethnicity data according to the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) standards
- OMB defines race and ethnicity as two separate concepts. People of Hispanic or Latino origin may be of any race group(s)
- Collection is based on self-identification
- People may identify with one or more race groups



## Why we ask questions on Race?

- Meet Legislative Redistricting Requirements
- Establish and evaluate the guidelines for federal affirmative action plans under the Federal Equal Opportunity Recruitment program
- Monitor compliance with the Voting Rights Act
- Monitor and enforce equal employment opportunities under the Civil Rights Act of 1964
- Identify segments of the population who may not be getting needed medical services under the Public Health Services Act
- Planning and implementing programs and services to communities

## Standards for Race and Ethnicity

U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB)

- The Race categories are not an attempt to *define* race biologically, anthropologically, or genetically.
- An individual's response to the race question is based upon **self-identification**.

#### INTRODUCTION

This report looks at our nation's changing racial and ethnic diversity. It is part of a series that analyzes population and housing data collected from the 2010 Census, and It provides a snapshot of race and Hispanic origin in the United States. Racial and ethnic population group distributions and growth at the national level and at lower levels of neggraphy are presented.

This report also provides an overview of race and ethnicity concepts and definitions used in the 2010 Census. The data for this report are based on the 2010 Census Redistricting Data (Public Law 94-171) Summary File, which is among the first 2010 Census data products to be released and is provided to each state for use in drawing boundaries for legislative districts.\(^1\)

<sup>1</sup> The 2010 Census Redistricting Data (Public Law 94-171) Summary File provides data on Fisspanic origin and race, including information on the population reporting more than one race as well as detailed nece combinations (e.g., white and Asian, Native). In this report, the multiple-race combination categories are denoted with the conjunction and in bold and italicized print to indicate the specific race groups that comprise the particular combination. This report discusses data for the 50 states and the District of Columbia but not Puerto Ris.

The 2010 Census Redistricting Data (Public Law 94-17) Summy File does not contain data for detailed Hispanic origin groups (e.g., Mexican or Puerto Rican) or detailed information about race or tribes (e.g., Chinese, Samoan, or Choctaw). Therefore, these specific groups are not discussed in this report. Data on detailed and Hispanic origin groups and detailed information about race and tribes will be released on a state by state basis as part of the 2010 Census Demographic Profile and the 10210 Census Summary File 1. UNDERSTANDING RACE AND HISPANIC ORIGIN DATA FROM

The 2010 Census used established federal standards to collect and present data on race and Hispanic origin.

For the 2010 Census, the questions on race and Hispanic origin were asked of Individuals living in the United States (see Figure 1). An Individual's responses to the race question and to the Hispanic origin question were based upon

#### Race in combination


Reported more than one detailed race group, part of a larger race category, or more than 1 of the 6 race categories

Combined Race alone and Race-in-combination




## History of Race and Ethnicity Collected in the U.S. Decennial Census



- Measured Since 1790
- Census form has reflected changes in society
- Influenced by social, political, and economic factors
- 1980 Census to present follows the Office Management and Budget standards
- Based on self-identification

### **American Community Survey**

The American Community Survey (ACS) is the premier source for information about America's changing population, housing and workforce.

### **Current Population Survey**

The Current Population Survey (CPS) is a monthly survey sponsored by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and conducted by the Census Bureau.

#### **Decennial Census**

The U.S. census counts every resident in the United States. It is mandated by Article I, Section 2 of the Constitution and takes place every 10 years.

## Survey of Income and Program Participation


Survey of Income and Program Participation (SIPP) collects data and measures change for many topics including: economic well-being, family dynamics, education, assets, health insurance, and childcare.

## **Decennial Census**

- Mandated by the Constitution of the United States, Article I, Sections 2 and 9, directs that a census or enumeration be taken.
- The first U.S. census was in 1790 during the first term of our first president, George Washington.
- Used to determine how to apportion or determine the number of seats each state has the House of Representatives.
- The U.S. census counts each resident of the country, where they live on April 1, every ten years ending in zero.

## **American Community Survey**

- The nation's most current, reliable, and accessible data source for local statistics on critical planning topics such as age, children, veterans, commuting, education, income, and employment
- Surveys 3.5 million addresses and informs over \$675
   billion of Federal government spending each year
- Covers 40+ topics, supports over 300 evidence-based Federal government uses, and produces 11 billion estimates each year

## Three key annual data releases:

#### **1-year Estimates:**

Data for areas with populations of 65,000 or more

#### 1-year Supplemental Estimates:

Data for areas with populations of 20,000 or more

#### **5-year Estimates:**

Data for all areas



# Response Outreach Area Mapper (ROAM)


- Interactive web-mapping application






